SCHOOL PROFILE



Katapor M/A Primary School is a public school in the Ga-West Municipality. It is located about 3km from Pokuase towards its west. The school was started as a community nursery with the assistance from the World Vision International (W.V.I) in March 1985. This nursery was housed temporarily at the premises of Katapor Good News Church.

In the course of time, the need arose for permanent structure to be built. As a result, a three classroom block, an office and a store were built in 1987. Furniture and teaching aids were supplied by (W.V.I). Later, the lower and upper primary blocks were also built with the assistance again from (W.V.I).

In 1992/93 academic year, the school was absorbed into the mainstream as a public school. Six trained teachers were posted to the school as well as some

nursery attendants. In 2003/04, a staff bungalow was also built. The school has a big playing ground for co-curricular activities and also a well-spaced library which is shared with the Junior High School.

Currently, the school benefits from the school feeding program. It has been connected to the national grid as well, thanks to the school P.T.A and Open Learning Exchange (O.L.E) Ghana. This has helped in the teaching of I.C.T and in the usage of the equipment donated by OLE Ghana as part of the Ghana LITE project. Currently, the school has thirteen (13) teachers on staff (Kindergarten to primary six) and 312 pupils. Before the school joined the GHANA READS project being run by OLE Ghana, the number on roll was 243.

Again, OLE Ghana has started another project in the school dubbed "Ghana Reads" project is meant to improve upon literacy in the school. This project covers the whole school (ie) from KG-P6. This program is being carried out currently in 20 basic schools in the country. Katapor Primary is proud to be associated with the successful implementation of this program since it was used as a pilot school to learn lessons vital for the success of this new OLE Ghana program.

It is our hope by the end of this project, Katapor M/A Primary School will be one of the top most public schools in the country.
